Local heritage advocate, John Dowson, is concerned that the State Heritage Council may not recomend it for heritage listing.

Cygnet Cinema

Over 40 members and supporters of the Art Deco and Modernist Society of Western Australia had the pleasure of touring the recently refurbished Cygnet Cinema (formerly Como Theatre). This event was graciously hosted by the property developer, Australian Property Collective, in collaboration with their heritage advisory firm, Element Advisory.

Adding a touch of nostalgia to the occasion, Garry Leighton, the son of the cinema's original architect and attendee at our very first meeting in 1987, graced us with his presence and shared insightful memories of the establishment's construction.

During the tour, the developer's representative, Brett Jackson, emphasised that while the cinema itself may not be financially viable, the increase in foot traffic it generates would enhance the value of surrounding developments owned by the company. This rationale justified the investment in the refurbishment of the Cinema.

Moving forward, it is crucial for us to monitor future developments and ensure that the cultural significance of this important Art Deco landmark remains intact amid any changes and surrounding developments.

The tour also featured enlightening talks from our President, Vyonne Geneve, Vice President, Philip McAllister and Element Advisory's heritage architect, Alana Jennings.

Regal Theatre

A proposed 9 storey development adjacent to the Regal Theatre will be including a substantial investment in the conservation and improved amenities of the heritage listed Art Deco building.

Members of the Society will be having a careful look at the proposed development and will provide further information in the next email update.

As with the Cygnet Cinema the issue is going to be how the adjacent developments will impact the heritage signficance of the place.
